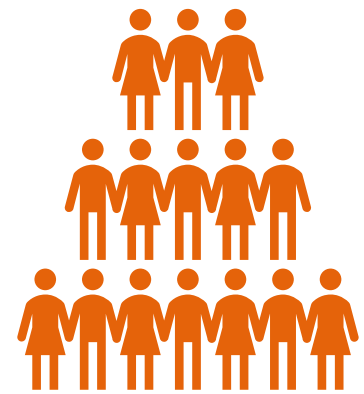

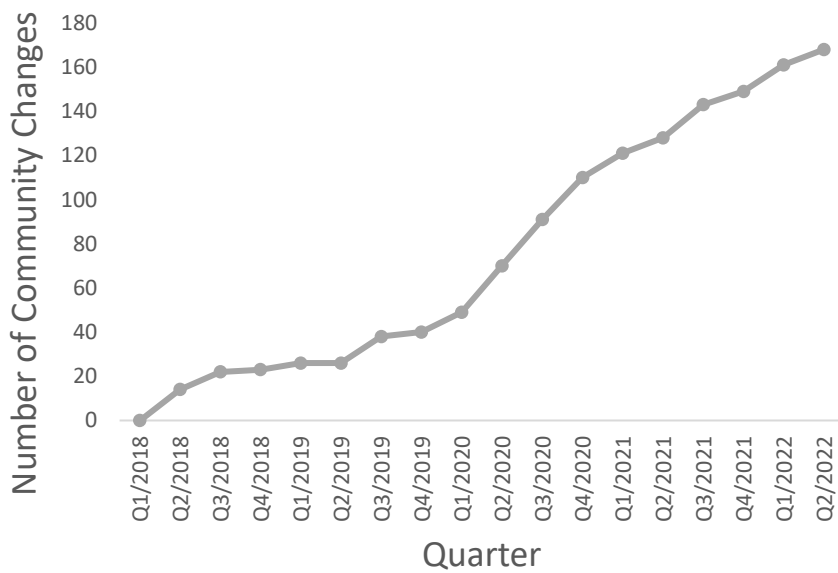

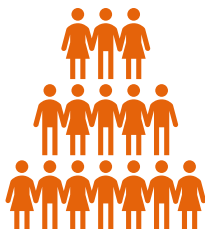

- REVIVE Hospital Intervention Program
- Formation of county Youth Fatality Review Board
- Development of the Youth Opportunity Collaborative
- Youth Ambassadors Program
- In collaboration with partners, a menu of weekly in-person opportunities for youth during out-of-school time

Project Outcomes

For ThrYve youth:



- **Improvements in**
 - Academic performance (increasing GPA)
 - Number of law enforcement encounters
- **Risk/Protective Factors**
 - Lower 30-day substance use
 - Reduced perceived risk of harm for marijuana use
 - Reduced risk at laws/norms favorable to drugs, antisocial behavior, interaction with antisocial peers
